Cracking Codes

Task 1: Research one of the codes listed above or a code of your own choice. Include the following information:

- What symbols/pictures does this code use?
- Why was this code invented?
- · Where did it originate?
- · When and how is it used?

Task 2: Create a secret message using your chosen code (around 50 – 100 characters long).

Task 3: Present your research project to an appropriate audience using visual aids to support your presentation (e.g. posters, a slide show, Smartboard, props etc). Display the secret message you prepared in Task 2 and show your audience members how to decipher it. See how fast they can decode the secret message.

Tips for presenting an oral report:

- ♦ Project your voice so that the audience can clearly hear what you are saying.
- ♦ Maintain a steady, even speaking pace making sure you don't rush through it.
- ♦ Look as though you are interested in the material you are presenting by keeping your face animated.
- ♦ Maintain eye contact with your audience during the presentation as much as possible.

- Create a biographical text about Sherlock Holmes.
